

THE HISTORY

In 1995, Rev. Dr. Johnny Ray Youngblood from St. Paul Community Baptist Church in Brooklyn began the first Maafa Commemoration in the U.S. to "express the grief of the catastrophe that befell his ancestors and the horrific journey of millions of black people from freedom in Africa to bondage in the New World."

On Saturday, June 21 the Archdiocese of St. Louis, led by Archbishop Rozanski, will hold the 4th annual Forgive Us Our Trespasses Prayer Service and Maafa Procession in downtown St. Louis to commemorate the approximately 2 million lives lost during the "Middle Passage"

WHAT TO EXPECT

of the Atlantic slave trade.

The event begins at the Old Cathedral at 9:00 a.m. with a prayer service and continues with a remembering ceremony at the south pond of the arch grounds, followed by a 1-mile procession to St. John the Apostle and Evangelist Church where we will fellowship while sharing a meal.
