

September 7, 2024

On September 7, 2024, a prayer breakfast commemorating the 40th anniversary of the pastoral letter *What We Have Seen and Heard* brought together over 90 attendees. The event highlighted the ongoing impact of the Ferguson uprising in 2014 and featured four ministries that emerged in its aftermath.


Joyce Jones, director of The Office of Racial Harmony and Black Catholic Ministries, opened with the spiritual "Wade in the Water," drawing parallels between its themes and the struggle for racial justice. Cheryl Archibald, representing the National Black Catholic Congress Implementation Team, discussed the significance of the pastoral letter in addressing racial issues. Ophelia Wilson, Grand Lady of the Knights and Ladies of St. Peter Claver, shared the organization's history in St. Louis, while Katie Jansen and Carol Johnson discussed their personal experiences with the North City Interracial Relations Committee and the St. Vincent de Paul Society, respectively.

Archbishop Mitchell T. Rozanski addressed "The Work Ahead," emphasizing the need for continued action against racism. Marie Kenyon, director of the Peace and Justice Commission, called for a collective commitment to this mission. The event concluded with a prayer crafted in 2014 by The North City Interracial Relations Committee, reinforcing the gathering's focus on reflection, unity, and action in the pursuit of racial justice.





DID YOU KNOW?



Día de los Muertos is a cultural and religious tradition that is celebrated in the Catholic Hispanic community around the Solemnity of All Saints and the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed in which we remember our deceased loved ones. Culturally, this remembrance was a way to honor the dead and maintain communion with them. Religiously, this cultural tradition touches on a truth that early Christians who gathered to celebrate Mass in cemeteries also noticed, namely, that we are still in communion with those who have gone before us. The faithful departed are still our family.

To celebrate and commemorate the faithful departed, we build an *ofrenda* or altar of remembrance. We share pictures of our loved ones as well as their favorite foods, drinks, or perhaps an object that they were fond of on the ofrenda.

We invite you all to participate with us in celebrating *Día de los Muertos* by bringing pictures of your deceased loved ones and placing them on the *ofrenda*. You can find an *ofrenda* in the lobby of the Rigali Center.

A FOCUS ON STL

THE SMITHSONIAN HELPS ST. LOUIS DIGITIZE ITS BLACK HISTORY.

The destruction of neighborhoods and the displacement of families of color have historically hindered people's connection to their roots throughout the U.S., including St. Louis. This troubling trend is evident in recent initiatives aimed at acknowledging the lost Chinatown in Downtown St. Louis and highlighting the predominantly Black neighborhood of Mill Creek Valley—both of which fell victim to urban renewal projects and neglect from previous government administrations.

The Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture aims to preserve fragile audio and video recordings, as well as delicate paper artifacts, for Black communities nationwide. This month, they have established a presence in St. Louis at Cardinal Ritter College Prep.

Residents of St. Louis who possess artifacts representing Black history and culture and wish to have them digitized can register on the Smithsonian's community curation website dedicated to the St. Louis area. Here, they can specify the types of items they can contribute for personal historical documentation.
